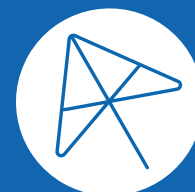

This year has seen many changes for the Association. APRICOT was held in Melbourne in February, the first time the renowned industry event has been held in Australia since 2006. # THE YEAR AHEAD

This year we have some great projects planned, with much expected to be completed by the time the AGM takes place.

## ON THE TECHNOLOGY FRONT

- RPKI – will be implemented and validating all BGP routes across the exchanges
- Increased redundancy and diversity through our intercapital bandwidth expansion project.
- Replacement of the Extreme BDX8 switches and expansion of the switching fabric in Sydney and Melbourne, to enable easy growth and better stability.
- More automation of our provisioning and configuration management, with the replacement of our compute clusters and upgrades to the route servers.
- The beginnings of a portal replacement project.

## ON THE ORGANISATIONAL FRONT

- Increasing our presence in the advocacy space, building our relationships with the regulators, politicians, and other stakeholders.
- Refreshing our social and mainstream media interactions to increase our presence.
- Conducting a thorough review of our rules, and putting a proposal to members to consider a transition to incorporation as a not-for-profit entity under federal corporations law.





# PANDEMIC?

## WHAT PANDEMIC?

Along with everyone else, we made a lot of changes to ensure we gave our highest priority to staff health and wellbeing whilst ensuring business continuity. We also recognised the importance of our role as a specialist provider of critical infrastructure.

To prepare for and manage this situation, we established a business continuity framework aligned with the recommendations of the Australian Government health fact sheet for COVID-19 and monitored global activity, taking advice from relevant government agencies, the WHO, and actively followed relevant notices and alerts. Luckily, our team has remained safe, but certainly busy!

### WHAT DID WE DO?

We worked with our team and members to ensure infrastructure and business continuity during this time. This included:

- Upgrading networks to handle the increase in network traffic
- Deferring any unnecessary work
- Restricting major changes to essential ones only
- Reassessing our spares, extra port availability and remote hands services to ensure any failures were and are dealt with rapidly
- Providing or coordinating the use of remote hands services to reduce travel and maximise skilled staff availability
- Adhering strictly to pandemic protocols in place in data centre facilities



# PANDEMIC?

## WHAT PANDEMIC?

### PERSONAL HEALTH & SAFETY

A key focus area in caring for staff and members continues to be working to prevent the transmission of COVID-19 in our workplaces. To achieve this, we put the following measures in place:

- Anyone feeling unwell remains in isolation
- Anyone wishing to attend our colo or data centres must advise if there have been any team members within their organisation with symptoms or known cases of COVID-19 before they attend
- Domestic business travel was restricted to business-critical purposes
- Widespread use of hand sanitiser

### WORKING FROM HOME

Our team is well accustomed to working remotely or from home and our systems are designed for this. More than once, however, staff had to have children around them on calls as alternative care arrangements were disrupted. This meant the occasional piano lesson alongside contract reviews, and jam sandwiches far closer to keyboards than usual!

### COLLABORATION IS KEY

Without wanting to overuse the terms “extraordinary” and “unprecedented”, it really has been a time of challenge for everyone, and our team, customers, suppliers, stakeholders and the relevant authorities, have just been amazing as we’ve all had to listen, take advice and importantly, take decisive action to help everyone through this period.

# TECHNICAL REPORT

We started the year with 37 POPs in service (including those operated on behalf of the New Zealand Internet Exchange, NZIX) keeping all in service apart from one (DC3) which was decommissioned in Queensland when TPG ceased operations on the site. NZIX has similarly grown and we assisted them in commissioning the new Christchurch exchange CHC-IX.



# OUR PLATFORM AND SYSTEMS ARE STRONGER

- Daily AS-SET updates are now fully automated!

- ADL-SYD – Pending  $2 \times 10G$

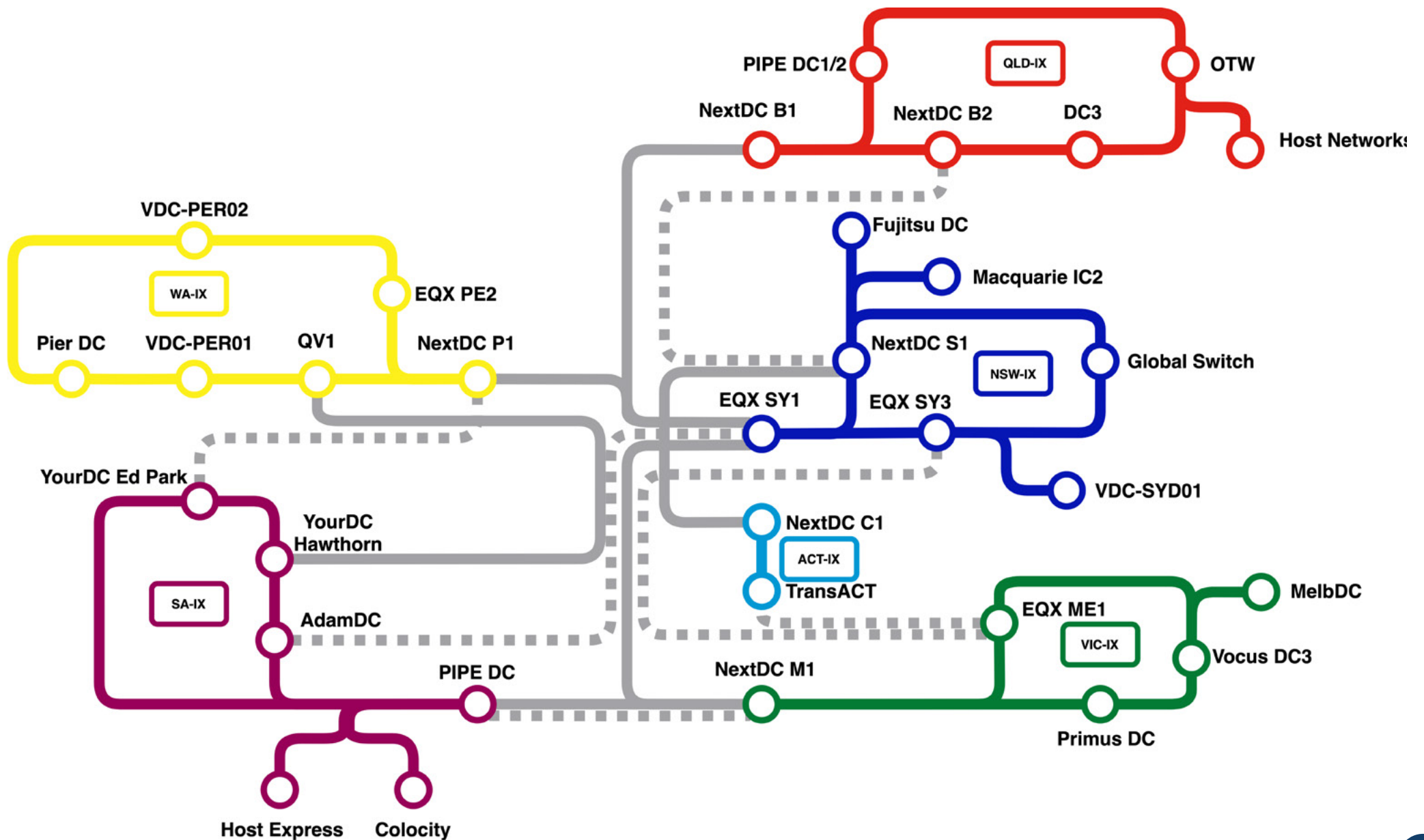

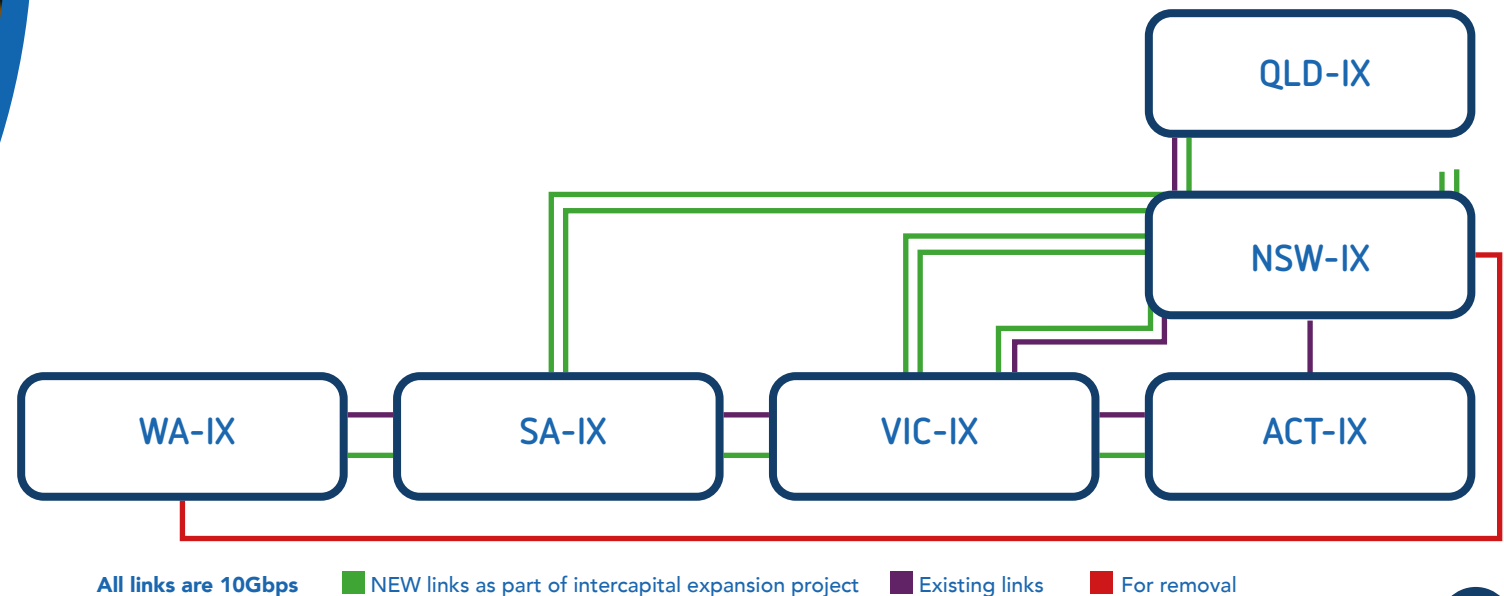
# INTERCAPITAL EXPANSION PROJECT

We have conducted a study of our intercapital link capacity and undertaken a significant upgrade program, ensuring path diversity and an appropriate level of capacity for our VLL, extended reach and cache fill requirements.

## Intercapital Backbone Upgrades

- NSW-QLD – Completed  $4 \times 10\text{G}$
- NSW-VIC – Increasing from  $2 \times 10\text{G}$  to  $4 \times 10\text{G}$
- VIC-ADL – Increasing to  $2 \times 10\text{G}$
- ADL-PER – Increasing to  $2 \times 10\text{G}$
- ADL-SYD – Increasing to  $2 \times 10\text{G}$

We are also planning expansions to the intra-IX rings over the coming year as and when capacity is required.

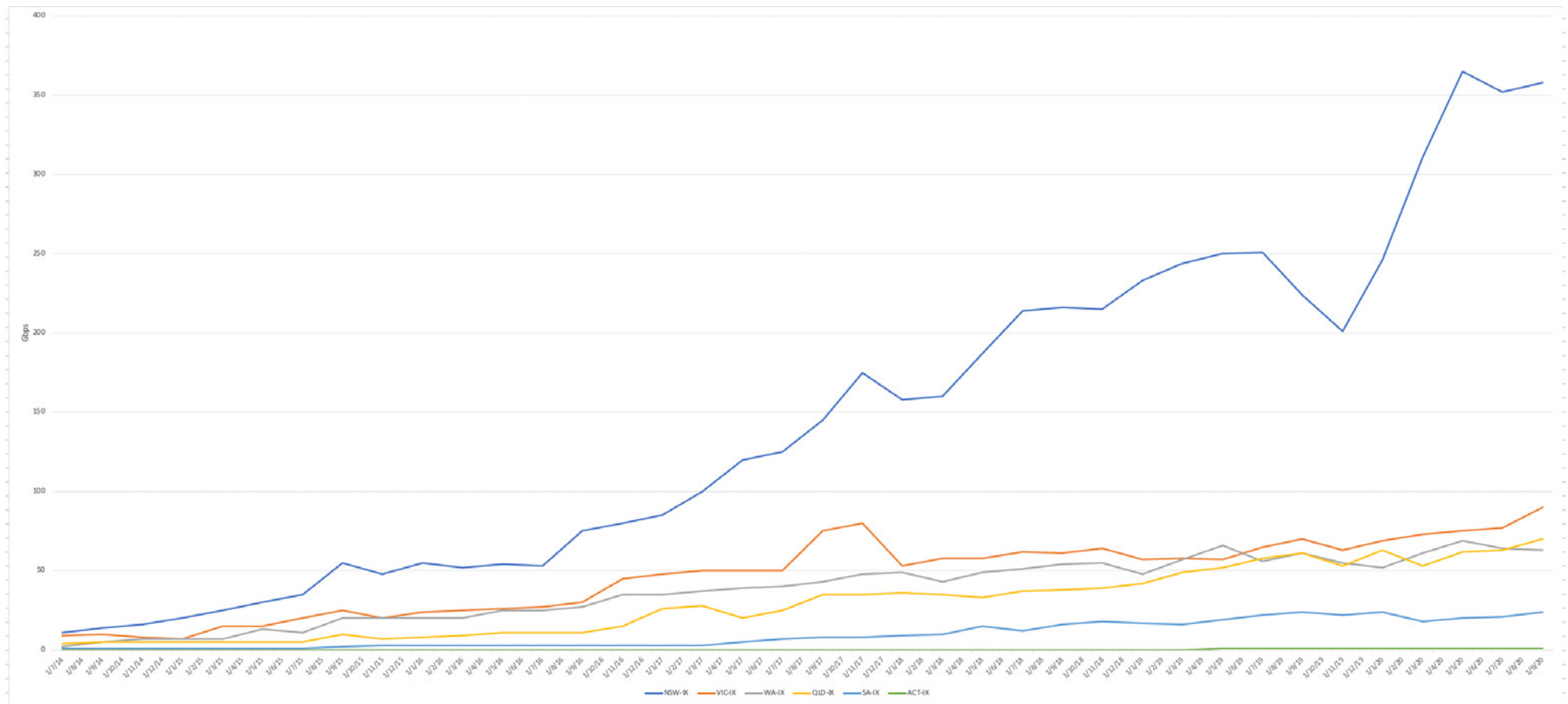

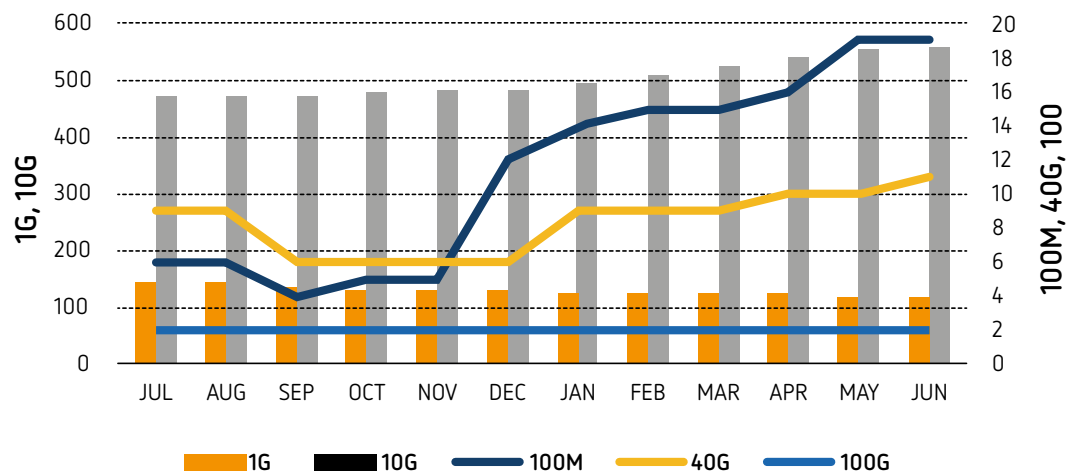

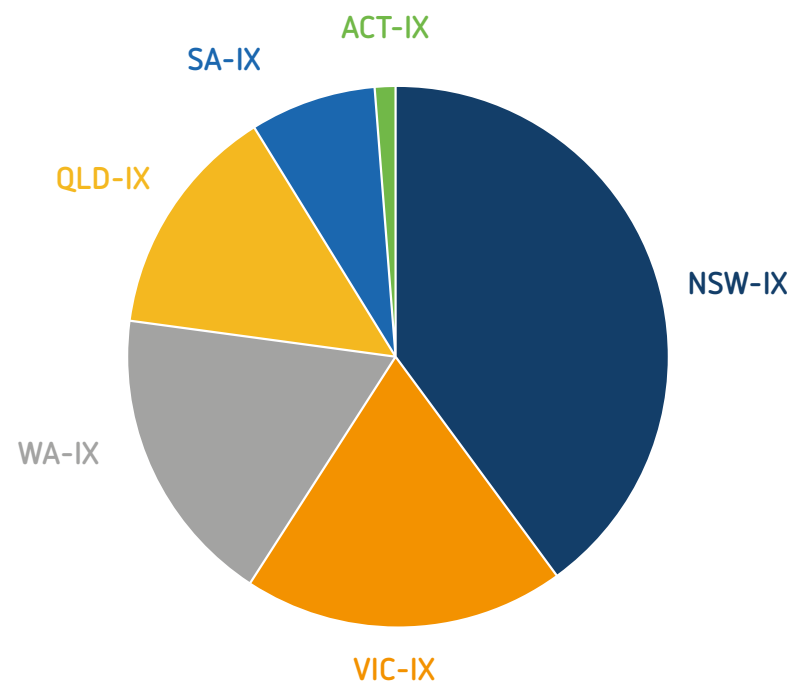

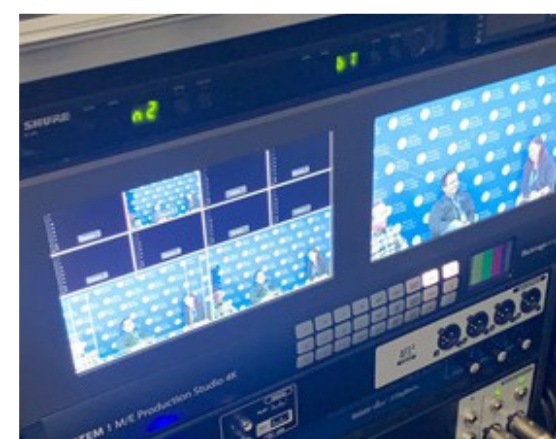
AGGREGATED TRAFFIC ACROSS THE EXCHANGES

# EVENTS

Our events have formed a large part of our engagement with members this year.

We completed our **Unplugged** event series with some great socials in Brisbane, Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide, and Perth. The monthly catch ups around the nations capitals gave us a forum to chat face-to-face with members about what the year had in store for many businesses and more broadly the technology sector. They gave us an insight into member needs, and allowed us to develop our goals for the year ahead to accommodate them. We also hosted some fun end of year socials to celebrate with members across the country.

With the arrival of COVID-19, like many organisations, we had to adapt our events calendar, introducing the online event series, **Life Under Lockdown**. This gave us the opportunity to bring exciting topics to our members and keep in touch as everything went virtual.

The first Life Under Lockdown event looked specifically at how the internet has held up during the pandemic and featured an exceptional panel comprising members Aussie Broadband (Phil Britt), Vocus (Brett O'Hara) and Field Solutions Group (David Hooton) interrogated in a fun and engaging style by our new CEO. Our second event in the series took a more practical approach on the implementation of RPKI with a step by step guide from APNIC's Tashi Phuntsho and foreshadowed our own implementation plan.

Once again in September 2019 we sponsored another successful AUSNOG event in Melbourne.

IAA fulfilled our hosting duties for **APRICOT 2020** in February and would like to thank everyone who attended the event at Melbourne's Crown Promenade.

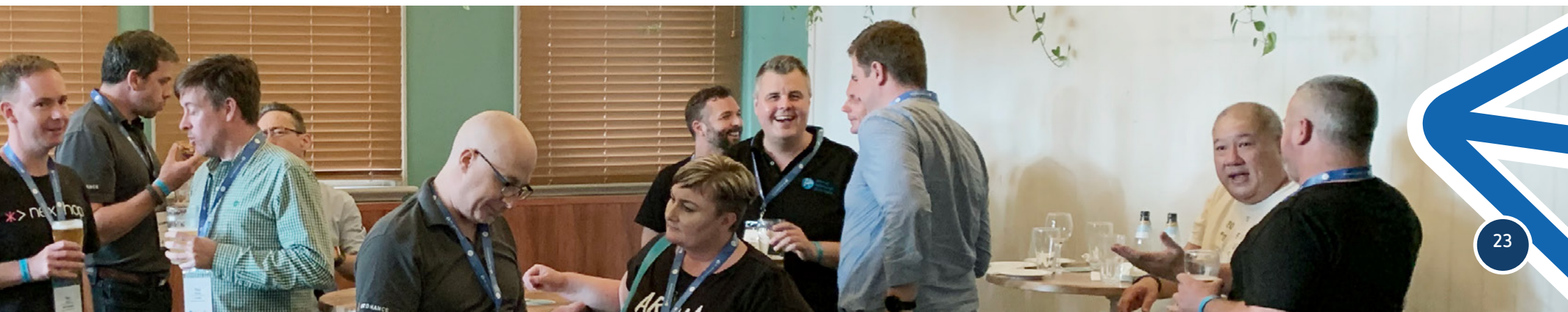
Despite travel restrictions caused by COVID-19, APRICOT 2020 still attracted over 560 people, across 60 economies, making APRICOT the biggest industry event IAA has been involved in, to date.

With five days of workshops and over 50 presentation sessions during conference week, the IAA team worked tirelessly to ensure the smooth running of the network. At times during the fortnight, there were over 1000 devices connected to the Wi-Fi simultaneously. Who'd have known we had that many tucked away in our pockets!

The 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of APRICOT was celebrated at social events across the city. Storms didn't deter conference goers attending the opening social at Melbourne Town Hall, organised and sponsored by IAA.

The success of APRICOT's 25 years promoting Internet technology and operations across the Asia Pacific region was marked at a formal dinner at the stunning Plaza Ballroom.

Despite travel restrictions, we have still successfully worked to bring the industry together.





# PUBLIC POLICY ENGAGEMENT

IAA dipped its toe into the public policy water this last year with two member round tables, one to discuss future NBN scenarios and one on the Assistance and Access Bill (also known as the Telecommunications and Other Legislation Act). In each of these, members were able to express their views on the impact of these public policy initiatives.

By putting these views to the Independent National Security Legislation Monitor, we are confident that our voice will be taken into account when the federal government releases its response to the review of the AA Bill (due late 2020). This type of legislation imposes significant burden on members as it is complex and cumbersome, especially for smaller Internet providers.

We trust members will continue to make their views known to us so that we may represent you effectively and coherently. Our CEO regularly meets with regulators, politicians and broader industry stakeholders on these and other matters.

# FINANCIAL SUMMARY AND OUTLOOK

This year some overdue expenditure on new switching and compute capacity and maintenance was made, having been deferred from previous years. Following this, the incoming CEO led a full budget planning process, and the Board approved a formal, full year budget for FY 20/21. This marks the adoption of improved forecasting and planning. Staffing also increased from 5.7 FTE to 7.8 FTE.

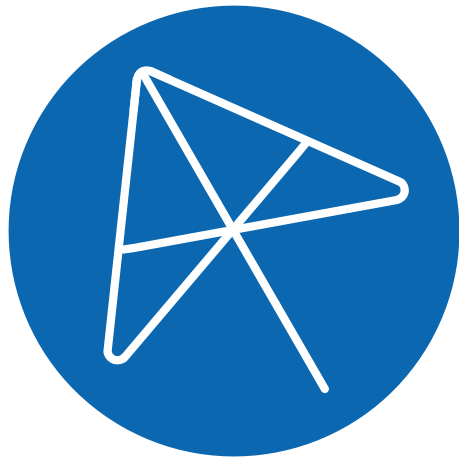
